# 2018 PROGRAM REVIEW

# Being part of change....

On the pages to follow you will find the basic statistics from Neighborhood House for 2018. It's a snap shot of the people we have served and how we

served them. But what is miraculous is what goes on behind the scene. Recently, I attended a workshop focusing on using **trauma** informed practices in programs serving youth. It is clear, our staff members are working with children who have been traumatized. If you want to be a part of real social and economic change, consider a gift to Neighborhood House and consider *a day in the life of 2<sup>nd</sup> grader, Tayon.* 

6:30 AM Tavon is up for school but his Mom is sleeping on the floor, vodka bottle nearby, he can't wake her up. Trauma 1- lack of emotional support. Trauma 2- exposure to alcohol and drug abuse.

7:00 AM Trying to finish his school work from previous day. No breakfast food. Milk is sour. Can't make it to school in time to eat breakfast. Will have to wait for lunch or dinner at Neighborhood House. Trauma 3- Lack of adequate nutrition.

8:30 AM Boy in the school hallway bullying Tavon and making fun of his clothing; said "he stinks." Trauma 4 – Lack of basic needs (clean clothing and hygiene products) Trauma 5- Experiencing unwanted aggressive behavior by another youth-bullying.

This takes place in the first 2 hours of this child's day. If we jump a couple hours ahead, we find youth staff dealing with the fallout...

2:30 PM After-school Program at Neighborhood House. Staff witness and experience the results of Tavon's trauma...

- 1. Negative behavior; Tavon kicks another kid in program and calls him a curse word.
- 2. Indifference to homework assignments resulting in unfinished school work previous week. He's not reading at his grade level. Tardiness and truancy are a weekly occurrence.
- 3. Parent failed to recognize importance of Tayon adhering to rules for his own safety.
- 4. Parent shows contempt for staff and rules resulting in Tavon disrespecting staff.
- 5. Tavon is suspended from the program and seen hanging on street corner.

It doesn't end here. Neighborhood House developed a safe plan to bring Tavon back into the youth program and the change begins. Today, Tavon is helping others with homework, reading on his grade level and getting the help he needs to succeed!

We need your help to continue giving kids like Tavon the tools they need to overcome negative patterns and related negative outcomes in their lives. It's not easy, but the goal of all of the Neighborhood House programs is to help people find the tools to succeed. As you consider your contribution, remember us as we have been helping kids with homework, tutoring math and serving nutritious food for over 92 years. Yes, the culture has changed in a century, but the mission of Neighborhood House helping youth thrive in school, helping parents in crisis and fostering social change in the community marches forward.

## **Family Services and Homeless Prevention**

Designed to assist families and individuals in crisis to meet their immediate basic need for food, clothing, heat, electricity, diapers, school supplies, bus passes and co-pays. This is made possible by providing an emergency food closet, clothing, financial assistance/leveraging funds for utility bills, bus tickets for employment interviews and life skills workshops. Each year NHI assists families in poverty with Thanksgiving/Christmas food baskets.

One of our neighbors died suddenly at a young age. She left behind two teenage girls, one expecting a baby the next month. NHI was able to arrange for the family to be accepted on a payment plan with Delmarva Power keeping them in their home and protected from becoming homeless.

# Housing Counseling and Foreclosure Prevention

Housing Counseling Department at NHI provides a full range of services and advice to housing consumers in order to increase the number of homeowners and tenants by assisting them to purchase, rent and maintain affordable housing. The program is approved by the Dept. of HUD to provide comprehensive housing counseling. The program also offers pre-purchase seminars, homebuyer education workshops and home ownership preservation workshops.

# **Neighborhood Empowerment Center**



Equipping individuals with tools for success to become accomplished members of the community. Vision: Provide access to quality education and workforce development programs by partnering with strategic evidence based providers. The center will be located on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of NHI and will provide programs that teach computer skills and workforce development. Community members receive computer training for Word and Excel. Second Chance Credit Workshop run all year. All programs run through the NEC are free of charge to the community as funding allows.

# The Early Learning Center New Directions Early Head Start at Neighborhood House

The UD Early Learning Center, in partnership with New Directions Early Head Start,



provides full-day, year round early care and education for 32 children birth to age three and their families. The Center employs 9 professional staff who meets or exceeds the educational requirements set by the National Association for the Education of Young Children.

The cornerstone of the ELC's best-practices is the continuity of care model which is designed to support the positive growth and development of children; ensuring first that there is strong emotional security for each child and using play and children's curiosity as the foundation from which to support their cognitive, language, social, physical and emotional skill development.

Family supports are provided to each family including visits with a family's advocate

designed to support each parent as their child's first and primary teacher and assist families in identifying family goals. Each family develops a Family Partnership Agreement that outlines their goals for their children and themselves.
